

The US received a total of **7,391** tertiary level students from Colombia in 2019.

>> INTRODUCTION AND CONTEXT

From the **Inbound Mobility Report** carried out by CCYK with the support of the MEN in 2020, it was evidenced that During the period **2016 - 2019**, Colombia presented the following data in relation to incoming student mobility:

19,740 international students in academic semester.

- **38%** from North America (Canada, USA and Mexico).
- 6% from the US. (1,185 students) (4th country with the highest origin of international students).

19,459 international students in other mobility modalities (Short courses, academic missions, internships, practices, clinical rotations, Spanish courses, double degrees, volunteering, language assistants, others).

- **10%** from the US **(1,946 students)**, as the 3rd country with the highest number of international students in Colombia.
- According to the 2019 Open Doors Report, Latin America is the second favorite region, after Europe, for American students to study or develop an academic experience abroad. The report also reveals that 65% of US students who travel abroad for an international academic experience do so for summer school or shortterm programs of less than eight weeks.

>> INTRODUCTION AND CONTEXT

In order to support the **GO COLOMBIA strategy led by the Ministry of National Education – MNE**, the US Embassy built the GO COLOMBIA project for US HEIs to increase Study Abroad programs in Colombia by US HEIs.

In its first phase, AMERICAN VOICES conducted a survey of US citizens who have been in Colombia for academic or scientific purposes during the last 4 years with the aim of:

- To collect information from American students about their experience before, during, and after studying in Colombia, in order to define the main challenges and opportunities for higher education institutions in the United States to better connect with Colombian institutions.
- To Identify study motivations, expectations, realities, logistics and academic content of US citizens in Colombia.
- To discover trends about why American students choose Colombia and their experience in the country. This information is essential when promoting Colombia as an academic destination.


















- 1. Existence of **Exchange/Study Abroad Programs** and other agreements with US Institutions.

CONCLUSIONS

- For US students, aspects such as the political context of Colombia, researchers or academics, funding and available scholarships, the possibility of studying in specific cities, the geographical proximity of Colombia with respect to the US and the quality of the academic offer of Colombian HEIs.
- Although aspects such as the academic offer in English, the academic diversity in the offer of Colombian HEIs, acquaintances who have visited or studied in the country, the low cost of living in

Colombia, the mentoring of professors, researchers and academics, are not relevant and significant aspects when choosing Colombia as a destination.

- Aspects such as heritage or family of US students as a motivation factor for studying in Colombia or the academic quality of the offer in Colombia are not relevant.
- Regarding the realities encountered by US students in Colombia in relation to their experience, all categories were positively rated with lower performance: i) an interesting and relevant academic offer for professional development and ii) a country where the Projected academic goals.













- 5. Opportunity to teach English to university students.

>> CONCLUSIONS:

- For English Teacher Assistants-ETAs, the factors related to the available scholarships, the teaching of English at the university level are important motivations for choosing Colombia as a destination.
- Also highlighted within their motivations is interest in the political context of Colombia, a peculiarity that differentiates them from the motivations of other groups of students in the US.
- The motivations assigned to academic advisors and professors at their universities are motivations to take into account when choosing Colombia as a Destination.

• In relation to the realities with respect to the expectations, gastronomy, although it was a positive factor, did not have the same significant evaluation compared to the group of students.



>> CONCLUSIONS:

- For US professors and researchers, the main motivating factors for traveling to Colombia to develop academic and/or scientific activities are interest in the country's culture and motivations influenced by colleagues (professors, researchers, or academics).
- For teachers, the quality factor of the offer and the possibility of carrying out an activity in a specific city are more important than the other groups of citizens surveyed (students and ETAs) when choosing Colombia as a Destination.

- For some teachers the factor of scholarships or economic support for mobility is important, but for others it is not a relevant factor. Perhaps this is due to the fact that some universities have resources and others do not, and there is also a lack of knowledge in many of the US universities regarding financial support for teachers.
- Although the existence of agreements between Institutions are still important, for teachers it is not as fundamental a factor as in the case of students.
- Spanish continues to be an important factor to be taken into account by teachers when choosing Colombia as a destination.
- Factors such as the low cost of living or the location are not of greater relevance for the choice of teachers.



MAIN RESULTS AND OPPORTUNITIES FOR FUTURE COLLABORATIONS

- Agreements and MoU in the process of signing between Kansas State University and UTB, UniNorte and UniMagdalena.
- Proposal that these exercises be carried out between January-March of each year and not at the end of the year, since Study Abroad proposals are generally presented in August-September. In the same way, it is proposed that the people chosen to represent their HEIs in the US have greater preparation when connecting collaborations with various faculties and departments of their Institutions.
- It must be taken into account that the dynamics and conditions of academic and scientific collaboration between Colombia and the US are limited by the travel warnings issued by the US Government. This influences the negotiating imes with HEIs in the US.
- It is proposed to look for early victories:
- interest in carrying out short term programs for 2023 and 2024, exchange programs between undergraduate degrees with components of Social Justice and strengthening of Intercultural Competences for students and professors from the US and Colombia in the case of the Caribbean.
- Search for external funding for projects in Education with the Caribbean.

- Double Degree Opportunities between Col-USA.
- Collaborations for accreditations of joint programs.
- Work collaboratively among HEIs to participate in programs such as 100K Strong in the Americas.

Possibility of agreement with Prairie View A&M University and the universities of Cali. In addition to collaboration in areas such as Engineering, Natural Sciences and Social Sciences.

A Study Abroad program for US students offered online by universities in Cali is proposed.

- The three universities we visited were Universidad Tecnologica de Bolivar (UTB), UNINORTE and Universidad del Magdalena. They were very impressive with strong academic portfolios
- The location, since the Caribbean is a tourist destination;
- Currency exchange rates are favorable to the USD, which makes Colombia an affordable destination for K-State students and faculty.
- All three universities are in the top 30 in the country as member of the CCYK network;
- UTB's board is composed of the most business associations;
- Uninorte has a very strong student success and wellbeing system including a peer-peer system
- Universidad del Magdalena's College of Education Deanship is very committed to Internationalization initiatives
- Excellent in-country collaboration and support offered through CCYK and their partner institutions

Weaknesses

- English/Spanish language barriers will have to be overcome.
- Difficult process for Colombians to get U.S. VISA
- Travel warning in place makes Colombia a hard sale due to risk management for Americans
- UNINORTE currently has students teaching in the United States on their own initiative;
- UTB limited to summer faculty-led programs due to limited English proficiency;
- Universidad del Magdalena showed the least English proficiency;

Program Overview

In September 2022, the U.S. Embassy in Bogota and the Colombia-Challenge Your Knowledge (CCYK) Network released a call for applications for their, Paving the Way US-Colombia Immersion Program, to foster study abroad mobility from U.S.

The purpose of the program was to support U.S. study abroad in Colombia by selecting three (3) study abroad professionals from U.S. Higher Education Institutions to visit local institutions in Colombia to understand the context, review the institutional capacity to host students from the U.S., and offer recommendations to help increase study abroad capacity. The program was funded by a U.S. State Department grant from the Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs, Office of Study Abroad to support the selected study abroad representatives interests in developing and strengthening mobility from the U.S. to Colombia.

On October 4, 2022, I was informed by CCYK, Colombia Network that I was selected as one of the three representatives to participate in the program and would be visiting institutions in Antioquia and Santander region.

- Institutions with language schools to offer immersion programs in Spanish, both virtually and in-person, which are aligned to various sectors of the U.S. market.
- Expand efforts for faculty exchanges with U.S. partners and Fulbright.
- Incorporate virtual exchange programs with U.S. partners to connect U.S. and Colombian students that are outside of the classroom setting.
- Expand CCYK's promotional efforts to include the Forum on Education Abroad to reach more study abroad professionals.











>> Areas to Improve

Weaknesses

- Limited interactions has caused a lack of understanding for the research and grant practices of U.S. Institutions.
- Many of the institutions lacked summer semester courses which minimizes options for U.S. students to study abroad in Colombia.
- All but one institution had on-campus housing available, though some did offer other options for U.S. students studying abroad to secure.
- Little to no English options for academic courses, limiting a U.S. student's ability to participate in an exchange program.



Threats

- U.S. Department of State's Travel Warning for Colombia dramatically restricts many U.S. institutions ability to collaborate with Colombian intuitions.
- Current exchange rates for Colombians drastically limit their abilities to participate in reciprocal exchanges.
- Most grant opportunities are very competitive and limit funding to support a one-time project, not long- term, hindering the sustainability of some collaborative efforts.









>> Recommendations

- Universities offering services to US Institutions use the exchange rate to their benefit and not be afraid to charge more than their operating costs to create a revenue source.
- Research universities wanting to partner with U.S. partners need to evaluate their institutional standing compared to the Carnegie Foundation Classification to find appropriate partnerships.
- Create virtual exchange opportunities for both U.S. and Colombia students to engage in and help build incentives for U.S. students to study abroad in Colombia.
- Market Colombia/University/study abroad through the student perspective, i.e. "day in the life" and show the
 - Colombian experience through the student perspective.
- CCKY to expand networking efforts to include the Forum on Education Abroad to align with more U.S. Institutions study abroad offices.
